

Spelling at RPA

We are changing how we teach spelling at RPA. Each week the children will learn about a spelling pattern and some common exception words. Your child will no longer have a weekly spelling test but will be assessed termly on their progress. The teacher will also be looking for evidence that your child is applying their spelling knowledge in their independent writing. They will still be bringing their spelling book home, but instead of having a list of words, they will be given a spelling pattern, such as 'ai', and be asked to find their own words. They should then practise these words in some of the creative ways listed below.

Every child can still access Spelling Shed, which should continue to support them at home.

Lots of children learn in different ways which is why teaching them means using a range of approaches. This will also help them when applying spelling because they will see the word in different contexts. Here are some strategies for spelling:

- · Listening for the sounds and breaking them down
- · Breaking the word into syllables
- Using rhymes, mnemonics and songs to remember
- · Using visual approaches e.g. 'word shape', 'bubble writing'
- · Being multi-sensory e.g. 'word painting'
- · Using verbal and social e.g. 'spelling tennis'
- Kinaesthetic and physical e.g. 'spell jump'

As well as engaging in all the fun activities suggested, it is still important to put words into sentences. This puts the word into context and therefore helps them to apply and retain the spelling.

Internet Games



Search online for word games to practise spellings.

Spell jumps

Jump up and down on a trampoline or skip whilst saying each letter of your word you are spelling.

Hangman

Play hangman using your spellings.


Musical spellings



Make up a short rhyme or song to remember spellings or rules for spellings.


Spelling tennis

One person starts with a letter, the other adds one until a word is made. The last person to add a letter wins.



CONSONANT CIRCLE

Write out each of your spellings. Then go back and circle all of the consonants in your spelling words!



THREE TIMES

Write each spelling word three times. Use a different coloured pencil for each time.



BLUE VOWELS

Write out each of your spelling words. You will need a blue coloured pencil. Trace over the vowels in each word with the blue coloured pencil.



PYRAMID WRITING

Write your word out in the shape of a pyramid.

Example: Home

H H o H o m H o m e

BUBBLE LETTERS

Write each spelling word in bubble letters. After you have written in bubble letters, colour the word with coloured pencils.



ADDING MY WORDS

Write out each of your spelling words. How much is each spelling worth?

Consonants =10 Vowels = 5 Example: Said 10+5+5+10=30


VOWEL CIRCLE

Write out each of your spellings. Then go back and circle all of the vowels in your spelling words!




CONNECT THE DOTS

Write out each of your spellings using dots. Then connect the dots by tracing over them with a coloured pencil.



COLOURFUL WORDS

Write out each of your spellings. Write each letter using a different coloured pencil.



ACROSTIC POEM

Create an acrostic poem for 5 of your words.

Example: Snow

Soft and fluffy Never warm Open the door Wade into the cold

BACKWARDS WORDS

Write out your spelling words forwards and then backwards.

Example:

home emoh

TELL A STORY One chilly day a chess player took his chicken to church. He Write a story using all of your spelling <u>chuckled</u> as the <u>chicken challenged</u> some <u>cheese</u> to a <u>chess</u> words. Make sure you underline your challenge. spelling words **3D WORDS** Make your spelling words out of playdough or clay. **AIR WRITE** Write your spelling words in the air with your finger. Ask someone to read your words as you write. You could also ask someone to air write while you read the word! **SPELLING FLOWERS** Draw a big flower. Write each of your spelling words on one of the petals. **CONNECT THE DOTS** Write your spelling words using dots. Connect the dots you've drawn by tracing over them with a coloured pencil.
